- Google Files (Android)** – Includes a built-in “Clean” feature that detects duplicate files.

Cloud-Based Solutions:

- Google Photos** – Automatically detects and suggests duplicate photos for removal.
- iCloud (for Apple Users)** – Can identify duplicates when optimizing storage.

Step 2: Delete Duplicate Photos Safely

Once duplicates are identified, follow these best practices to remove them without losing important files:

1. Review Before Deleting

- Check Metadata** – Some duplicates may have different timestamps or locations.
