The good news is that you can switch carriers while keeping your current device if it's compatible. This guide explains how to switch carriers without purchasing a new phone, including compatibility checks, unlocking your device, and transferring your service smoothly.

Step 1: Check Your Phone's Compatibility

Not all phones work with every carrier. Before switching, verify whether your device is compatible with the new network. Here's how:

1. Determine Your Phone's Network Technology

Mobile networks operate on different technologies, primarily:

• **GSM (Global System for Mobile Communications)** Used by AT&T, T-Mobile, and most international carriers.

• **CDMA (Code Division Multiple Access)** Previously used by Verizon and Sprint (now largely phased out in favor of GSM-based LTE/5G).

Most modern smartphones (iPhone 6 and later, most Android phones from 2016 onward) support both GSM and CDMA, but older devices may not.

2. Check Carrier-Specific Compatibility

Each carrier has a **Bring Your Own Device (BYOD) compatibility checker** on their website. Enter your phone's **IMEI (International Mobile Equipment Identity)** number to confirm compatibility.

- **AT&T:** [AT&T BYOD Checker](#)
- **T-Mobile:** [T-Mobile BYOD Checker](#)
- **Verizon:** [Verizon BYOD Checker](#)
- **US Mobile, Mint Mobile, Visible, etc.:** Most MVNOs (Mobile Virtual Network Operators) use one of the major networks, so check their compatibility tool.

How to Find Your IMEI:

• **Dial *#06#** on your phone.

• **iPhone:** Go to **Settings > General > About** and scroll to **IMEI**.

• **Android:** Go to **Settings > About Phone > Status > IMEI**.

3. Verify 5G & LTE Band Support

If you want 5G or the best LTE speeds, ensure your phone supports the **frequency bands** used by the new carrier. Websites like [FrequencyCheck](#) can help compare your phone's bands with the carrier's network.

Step 2: Unlock Your Phone (If Necessary)

If your phone is **locked** to your current carrier, you must unlock it before switching. A locked phone only works with the original carrier's SIM card.

How to Check if Your Phone is Locked

- **Insert a SIM card from another carrier.** If you see a message like **"SIM Not Supported"** or **"Network Locked,"** your phone is locked.
- **Contact your current carrier** and ask if your device is unlocked.

How to Unlock Your Phone

For iPhones:

- **AT&T:** Request an unlock via [AT&T's unlock portal](#).
- **T-Mobile:** Use the [T-Mobile unlock app](#) or request via customer service.
- **Verizon:** Most Verizon iPhones are unlocked after 60 days of service.
- **Sprint:** Use the [Sprint unlock tool](#).

For Android Phones:

- **AT&T, T-Mobile, Verizon, Sprint:** Follow the same process as iPhones—request an unlock via the carrier's website or customer service.
- **Prepaid Carriers (Metro by T-Mobile, Cricket, Boost, etc.):** Some require **6–12 months of active service** before unlocking.

Note: Unlocking may take **24–48 hours**, so request it before switching.

Step 3: Choose a New Carrier & Plan

Once your phone is unlocked, research the best carrier for your needs. Consider:

- **Coverage** (Check [OpenSignal](#) or [RootMetrics](#))
- **Pricing & Plans** (Unlimited data, family plans, prepaid options)
- **Perks** (Free streaming, international roaming, hotspot data)

Step 4: Get a New SIM Card

To switch carriers, you'll need a **SIM card** from the new provider. Options include:

1. Physical SIM Card

- Order online (shipped for free or available in-store).
- Buy from a retail store (Walmart, Best Buy, carrier stores).

2. eSIM (Digital SIM)

- **iPhones (XS and later) & newer Androids** support eSIM.
- Activate instantly via the carrier's app or website.
- No physical SIM needed—great for dual-SIM users.

How to Activate:

Follow the carrier's instructions (usually involves scanning a QR code or entering an activation code).

Step 5: Port Your Phone Number (If Keeping It)

If you want to **keep your existing phone number**, you must **port** it to the new carrier.

How to Port Your Number:

1. **Do NOT cancel your old service** before porting—this can cause delays.

4. **Update APN settings** (if data isn't working):
5. **iPhone:** Usually auto-configures.
6. **Android:** Go to **Settings > Network & Internet > Mobile Network > Access Point Names (APN)** and enter the new carrier's APN settings (found on their website).

Step 7: Cancel Your Old Service (If Needed)

If you **didn't port your number**, you'll need to cancel your old service manually.

- **Call customer service** or cancel online.
- **Return any leased devices** (if applicable).
- **Pay any remaining balance** to avoid fees.

Warning: Some carriers charge **early termination fees (ETF)** if you're under contract.

Troubleshooting Common Issues

Issue	Solution
No Service After Switching	Restart phone, reinsert SIM, check APN settings.
Can't Make Calls/Texts	Ensure the number was ported correctly; contact new carrier.
Data Not Working	Update APN settings or reset network settings.
Phone Still Locked	Contact old carrier to confirm unlock status.
Voicemail Not Working	Set up voicemail with the new carrier.

â? **Back up your phone** before switching (iCloud, Google Drive, or computer).
â? **Check for carrier deals** (some offer **free SIMs, discounts, or bill credits**).
â? **Monitor your first bill** to ensure no unexpected charges.
