A single static shock—often too small for humans to feel—can permanently damage or destroy delicate circuits in smartphones, tablets, and other mobile devices. - **Removing adhesive tapes** (up to 12,000 volts)

Given the miniature and highly sensitive nature of modern phone circuitry, even minor ESD events can lead to latent defects, reduced performance, or complete failure.

How ESD Damages Phone Components

Phone parts, particularly integrated circuits (ICs), microchips, and printed circuit boards (PCBs), are designed with extremely thin conductive pathways. When ESD occurs, it can:

1. **Melt or Vaporize Tiny Conductors** â?? The sudden surge of current can burn through microscopic traces on a PCB.

- **ESD-safe shoes or heel straps** â?? Grounds the body when walking.

3. Handle Components Properly

- **Hold PCBs by the edges** â?? Avoid touching exposed circuitry.
- **Use ESD-safe tweezers and tools** â?? Metal tools should be grounded.

- **Store parts in anti-static bags** â?? Never place sensitive components on non-conductive surfaces (e.g., plastic trays, bubble wrap).
- **Avoid synthetic materials** â?? Use cotton or ESD-safe storage containers instead of plastic bins.

4. Control the Work Environment

- **Maintain humidity between 40â??60%** â?? Low humidity increases static buildup.
