2. Lossy Compression

How Lossy Compression Works:

â?? **Discrete Cosine Transform (DCT)**: Breaks the image into frequency components, discarding high-frequency details (which are less noticeable to the human eye).

â?? **Quantization**: Reduces the precision of color values, further shrinking file size.

How Quality Loss Occurs in Compressed Images

3. Color Banding

- **Cause:** Quantization reduces the number of available colors, leading to visible steps between shades.
- **Effect:** Smooth gradients (e.g., skies, shadows) appear as distinct bands of color.

4. Ringing Artifacts

- **Cause:** Occurs near high-contrast edges when compression introduces false oscillations.
- **Effect:** Ghost-like halos or ripples around sharp edges.

5. Mosquito Noise

- **Cause:** High compression introduces random noise around edges, resembling static.
- **Effect:** Fine details (e.g., hair, text) appear distorted.

Factors Affecting Compression Quality

Several variables influence how much quality is lost during compression:

1. Compression Level

- Higher compression ratios result in smaller files but more noticeable artifacts.
- Lower compression preserves quality but yields larger files.

2. Image Content

- **High-Detail Images (e.g., landscapes, textures):** More prone to artifacts.
- **Low-Detail Images (e.g., solid colors, gradients):** Compress better with minimal loss.

3. Color Depth

- **24-bit (True Color):** More data to compress, leading to potential quality loss.
- **8-bit (Indexed Color):** Fewer colors, easier to compress but limited in quality.

4. Resolution

- Higher resolutions (e.g., 4K) contain more data, making compression more challenging.
- Lower resolutions compress more efficiently but may lack detail.

5. File Format

- **JPEG:** Best for photographs but suffers from artifacts.

 - **WebP:** Balances quality and size better than JPEG.
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Best Practices for Balancing Compression and Quality

5. Test Different Compression Levels

- Compare compressed versions at different settings to find the best trade-off.
- Use tools like **Adobe Photoshop, GIMP, or online compressors (TinyPNG, Squoosh)**.

6. Consider Progressive vs. Baseline JPEG

- **Baseline JPEG:** Loads top-to-bottom (faster initial display but slower full load).
- **Progressive JPEG:** Loads in multiple passes (better for web, appears faster).
