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Google's Family Link and Parental Controls

Google Play Store Age Ratings

Google uses the **IARC (International Age Rating Coalition)** system, which provides region-specific ratings:

• **3+** Suitable for all ages.

How to Filter by Age Rating:

- **Apple App Store:** Go to **Settings > Screen Time > Content & Privacy Restrictions > Content Restrictions > Apps** and select the appropriate age limit.
 - **Google Play Store:** Open the **Play Store** app > **Profile Icon > Settings > Family > Parental Controls** and set the desired restrictions.
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3. In-App Purchase Restrictions

Unintended in-app purchases (IAPs) are a common concern for parents. Many free apps offer **microtransactions** for virtual goods, which can lead to unexpected charges if not properly managed.

Preventing Unauthorized Purchases on iOS:

1. Go to **Settings > Screen Time > Content & Privacy Restrictions**.
2. Tap **iTunes & App Store Purchases**.

Preventing Unauthorized Purchases on Android:

1. Open the **Google Play Store** app.

 3. Select **Require authentication for purchases** and choose **For all purchases through Google Play on this device**.
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4. Safe Search and Web Filtering

Many apps, especially browsers and social media platforms, allow users to access unrestricted web content. To mitigate risks, parents can enable **safe search** and **web filtering**.

Apple's Web Content Restrictions

- Go to **Settings > Screen Time > Content & Privacy Restrictions > Content Restrictions > Web Content**.
- Choose **Limit Adult Websites** or **Allowed Websites Only** to restrict access.

Google's SafeSearch and Web Filtering

- Open the **Google app** or **Google Chrome**.
 - Go to **Settings > Search Settings > SafeSearch Filters** and enable **Filter explicit results**.
 - For additional protection, use **Google Family Link** to block specific websites.
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5. App Privacy and Data Protection

Children's apps often collect personal data, which can pose privacy risks. Both Apple and Google enforce strict **privacy policies** for apps targeting children.

Apple's Privacy Protections

- **App Store Review Guidelines** require apps for children to comply with **COPPA (Children's Online Privacy Protection Act)**.

Google's Privacy Protections

- **Kaspersky Safe Kids** – Blocks harmful websites, manages screen time, and tracks device location.
