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9. Ignoring Water Resistance (If Applicable)

Many modern phones (e.g., iPhones, Samsung Galaxy, Google Pixel) have water-resistant seals. Replacing the screen without proper adhesive can compromise this feature.

What to Do Instead:

- **Use waterproof adhesive** if your phone is IP-rated.
