

Understanding Storage Requirements for 4K Video

• **RAW (REDCODE):** 50–100+ GB for 10 minutes

D. Frame Rate (FPS)

Higher frame rates (e.g., **60fps, 120fps**) increase file sizes because more frames are captured per second.

- **24fps (Cinematic):** Standard for films
- **30fps (Broadcast):** Common for TV and online content
- **60fps (High Motion):** Used for slow-motion and sports
- **120fps+ (Ultra Slow-Mo):** Requires significantly more storage

Example:
A 10-minute 4K video at **60fps** will be **~2x larger** than the same video at **30fps**.

E. Color Depth and Chroma Subsampling

- **Color Depth (Bit Depth):**

F. Audio Tracks

While video dominates storage, audio also contributes:
• **Stereo (2 channels):** ~1-2 Mbps
• **5.1 Surround Sound:** ~3-6 Mbps
• **Uncompressed PCM (24-bit/48kHz):** ~10-20 Mbps

2. Estimating Storage Needs for 4K Video

To calculate storage requirements, use the following formula:

File Size (GB) = (Bitrate in Mbps × Duration in seconds) / 8,000
