Best Practices for Lending Your Phone Safely

 - Apple does not have a built-in guest mode, but you can use **Guided Access** to restrict access to a single app.
 - Go to **Settings > Accessibility > Guided Access**.

- Enable **Guided Access** and set a passcode.
 - Open the app you want to share (e.g., Maps, Phone) and triple-click the side button to lock the device into that app.

3. Lock Down Sensitive Apps

If guest mode is unavailable, manually restrict access to sensitive apps before lending your phone.

App Locking Methods:

- **Android:**
 - Use built-in app lock features (e.g., Samsung Secure Folder, Xiaomi App Lock).
 - Install third-party apps like **AppLock** or **Norton App Lock** to password-protect individual apps.
 - **iPhone (iOS):**
 - Enable **Screen Time** restrictions:
 1. Go to **Settings > Screen Time > App Limits**.
 2. Set a passcode and restrict access to sensitive apps.
 - Alternatively, use **Shortcuts Automation** to hide apps temporarily.

4. Disable Biometric Unlocking

Fingerprint and facial recognition make unlocking your phone convenient, but they can also be exploited if someone forces you to unlock your device. Before lending your phone:

- **Temporarily disable biometric unlocking** and switch to a PIN or password.
 - **Android:** Go to **Settings > Security > Biometrics** and disable fingerprint/face unlock.
 - **iPhone:** Go to **Settings > Face ID & Passcode** and disable Face ID temporarily.

5. Log Out of Sensitive Accounts

If you must lend your phone, ensure that all critical accounts are logged out, including:

- **Banking & Financial Apps** (PayPal, Venmo, mobile banking)
- **Email Accounts** (Gmail, Outlook, iCloud Mail)
- **Social Media** (Facebook, Instagram, Twitter/X)
- **Cloud Storage** (Google Drive, iCloud, Dropbox)
- **Messaging Apps** (WhatsApp, Telegram, Signal)

Quick Logout Steps:

- **Android:** Go to **Settings > Accounts** and remove or sign out of accounts.
 - **iPhone:** Go to **Settings > [Your Name] > Sign Out** (for iCloud) or manually log out of apps.

6. Enable Screen Pinning (Android) or Guided Access (iOS)

To prevent the borrower from exiting the app theyâ??re using, enable **screen pinning** (Android) or **Guided Access** (iOS).

Screen Pinning (Android):

1. Go to **Settings > Security > Screen Pinning**.
2. Enable the feature and set a PIN.
3. Open the app you want to share, tap the **Overview button (square)**, and select **Pin**.

Guided Access (iOS):

1. Go to **Settings > Accessibility > Guided Access**.
 2. Enable it and set a passcode.
 3. Open the app, triple-click the **Side button**, and select **Start**.

7. Monitor Usage in Real Time

If youâ??re lending your phone for an extended period, keep an eye on what the borrower is doing. Some ways to monitor usage include:

- **Check Recent Apps:** After getting your phone back, review recently opened apps.
 - **Review Call & Message Logs:** Ensure no unauthorized calls or texts were made.
 - **Use Screen Time Reports (iOS):** Go to **Settings > Screen Time** to see app usage.
 - **Android Digital Wellbeing:** Check **Settings > Digital Wellbeing** for app activity.

8. Factory Reset as a Last Resort (For Extreme Cases)

If you suspect your phone was compromised (e.g., malware installed, unauthorized access), a **factory reset** may be necessary. However, this should only be done if absolutely required, as it erases all data.

How to Factory Reset:

- **Android:** Go to **Settings > System > Reset Options > Erase All Data**.
- **iPhone:** Go to **Settings > General > Transfer or Reset iPhone > Erase All Content and Settings**.

Note: Always back up important data before performing a reset.

9. Educate the Borrower on Responsible Usage
