- **V** Verizon (U.S.).

3. Google Pixel Model Numbers

Google’s Pixel phones have relatively straightforward model numbers, often starting with **G** followed by a number and a regional suffix.

General Structure:

G[Model Number][Region Code]

- **G** Stands for Google.
- **Model Number (e.g., 0, 2, 5, etc.):**

OnePlus uses a mix of letters and numbers, with **LE** often indicating a global model and **GM** for China.

General Structure:

[Series][Model Number][Region Code]

Key Components:

- **Series (e.g., NE, LE, GM):**
 - **NE** North America.
 - **LE** Global (International).
 - **GM** China.
- **Model Number (e.g., 2215, 2301):**
 - **2215** OnePlus 10 Pro.
 - **2301** OnePlus 11.
- **Region Code (Optional):**
 - Some models include additional letters for specific carriers.

Example Breakdown:

5. Xiaomi Model Numbers
