

How to Verify a Phone's IMEI Number Before Purchase

How to Find a Phone's IMEI Number

1. Dial *#06# (Universal Method)

- Open the **Phone app** (dialer).
- Type *#06# and press **Call**.
- The IMEI number(s) will appear on the screen (some phones have two IMEIs for dual-SIM models).

Android:

- Go to **Settings > About Phone > Status > IMEI Information**.

- Remove the SIM tray and look for the IMEI engraved on it.
