

DIY Guide: How to Replace Your iPhone Screen at Home

Tools and Materials You'll Need

- Heat Gun (Low Setting)** — Alternative to a hairdryer for adhesive removal.
- Anti-Static Wrist Strap** — Prevents static damage to internal components.

Step-by-Step iPhone Screen Replacement Guide

Step 1: Power Off Your iPhone

Before disassembling your device, **turn it off completely** to avoid short-circuiting any components. Hold the power button and slide to power off.

Step 2: Remove the Pentalobe Screws

- Locate the two **Pentalobe screws** at the bottom of your iPhone, near the charging port.
- Use the **P2 Pentalobe screwdriver** to remove them and set them aside in a safe place.

Step 3: Heat the Screen to Loosen Adhesive

iPhones use strong adhesive to secure the screen. To make removal easier:

• The battery connector is located near the bottom of the phone.

• Use a **spudger or plastic pry tool** to gently lift the **battery connector** from its socket.

• **Do not touch any other connectors yet.**

Step 6: Remove the Display Assembly Screws

- The display assembly is held by **Phillips screws** near the top of the phone.
- Use a **#000 Phillips screwdriver** to remove them.
- Keep screws organized (a magnetic mat helps).

Step 7: Disconnect the Display Cables

- There are **three cables** connecting the screen to the logic board:
- **Digitizer (Touch) Cable**
- **LCD (Display) Cable**

- **Front Camera & Sensor Cable**
- Use a **plastic spudger** to carefully pry each connector upward.
- **Avoid bending the cables**—they are fragile.

Step 8: Remove the Old Screen

- Once all cables are disconnected, lift the screen away from the frame.
- If adhesive remains, use **isopropyl alcohol and a microfiber cloth** to clean the frame.

Step 9: Transfer Components to the New Screen (If Needed)

Some replacement screens come **pre-assembled**, while others require transferring parts from the old screen:

• **Home Button (Touch ID)** — If your iPhone has Touch ID, you **must** transfer the original home button to retain fingerprint functionality.

• **Ear Speaker & Front Camera** — Some screens require moving these components.

• **Proximity Sensor & Ambient Light Sensor** — Ensure these are properly aligned.

Step 10: Install the New Screen

- **Reconnect the display cables** to the new screen (digitizer, LCD, and front camera).
- **Secure the display assembly screws** (do not overtighten).
- **Reconnect the battery** last to avoid powering on the device prematurely.

Step 11: Test the New Screen Before Final Assembly

- **Power on the iPhone** to check:
- **Touch responsiveness** (test all areas of the screen).
- **Display colors & brightness** (no dead pixels or discoloration).
- **Front camera & sensors** (test Face ID if applicable).
- If everything works, proceed to final assembly.

Step 12: Reattach the Screen with Adhesive

- If your new screen includes **adhesive strips**, peel the backing and press the screen firmly into place.
- If not, apply **new adhesive strips** around the edges before securing the screen.
- **Press down evenly** to ensure a proper seal.

Step 13: Reinsert the Pentalobe Screws

- Power on the iPhone and **test all functions**:
 - **Touchscreen** (multi-touch, gestures).

 - **Front camera & Face ID** (if applicable).
 - **Speakers & microphones**.
 - **Home button** (if applicable).
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Common Mistakes to Avoid

1. **Forcing the Screen Open** â?? If the screen doesnâ??t lift easily, apply more heat instead of prying harder.
 2. **Not Disconnecting the Battery First** â?? This can cause a short circuit and damage the logic board.
 3. **Losing or Mixing Up Screws** â?? Different screws have different lengths; mixing them up can strip threads.
 4. **Damaging the Digitizer or LCD Cables** â?? These are delicate; handle with care.
 5. **Skiping the Testing Step** â?? Always test the new screen before fully reassembling to avoid rework.
 6. **Using Low-Quality Replacement Screens** â?? Cheap screens may have poor touch sensitivity or color accuracy.
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When to Seek Professional Help

While DIY screen replacement is cost-effective, some situations require professional assistance:

- â?? **iPhones with Face ID (iPhone X and newer)** â?? Replacing the screen yourself may **disable Face ID** due to Appleâ??s security measures.
