Design and Build Quality

Aesthetics and Ergonomics

The **90Hz refresh rate** is a welcome addition at this price, providing smoother scrolling and better responsiveness compared to standard 60Hz displays. However, brightness levels (peaking at **400 nits**) may struggle under direct sunlight, making outdoor visibility slightly challenging.

Performance: Powered by Exynos 850

Processor and RAM

The Galaxy A14 is equipped with the **Exynos 850 (8nm) chipset**, a budget-oriented processor that handles **basic tasks, social media, and light gaming** with relative ease. However, it may struggle with **heavy multitasking or demanding games** like *Call of Duty Mobile* or *Genshin Impact*.

The device comes in **two RAM variants**:

?? **4GB RAM + 64GB storage**

Storage and Expandability

While **bloatware** is present (including Microsoft and Facebook apps), it can be uninstalled or disabled.

Connectivity and Extras

5G Support (Model-Dependent)

The **Galaxy A14 5G** variant (sold in some regions) supports **sub-6GHz 5G**, while the standard **4G LTE model** is limited to **4G speeds**. Both versions include:

• **Dual SIM support** (nano-SIM + microSD or dual nano-SIM).

• **Wi-Fi 5 (802.11 a/b/g/n/ac), Bluetooth 5.0, GPS, and USB-C.**

• **No NFC** (in most regions), which means **no contactless payments**.

Audio and Biometrics
