- **CDMA Unlocked (Older Phones):** Some older Verizon or Sprint phones were CDMA-locked but may now work on GSM networks if they support LTE.

Modern smartphones (iPhone 6 and later, most Android flagships) are **universally unlocked**, meaning they support both GSM and CDMA networks.
